**We remember** Dougal Mackintosh, thematic collector of animals on stamps, who passed away on 29<sup>th</sup> November. Dougal's membership of the Society goes back many years. He was the Permanent Exhibition Superintendent from 1963-68, Superintendent of the Junior Section from 1963-66, Vice-President from 1965-67 and President from 1967-69. He was awarded the Fellowship of the Society in 1984 and in the same year, he presided over the Association of Scottish Philatelic Societies.

The host society at the **ASPS Congress in Perth** on 17-18<sup>th</sup> April 2015 will be the Falkirk and District Philatelic Society. 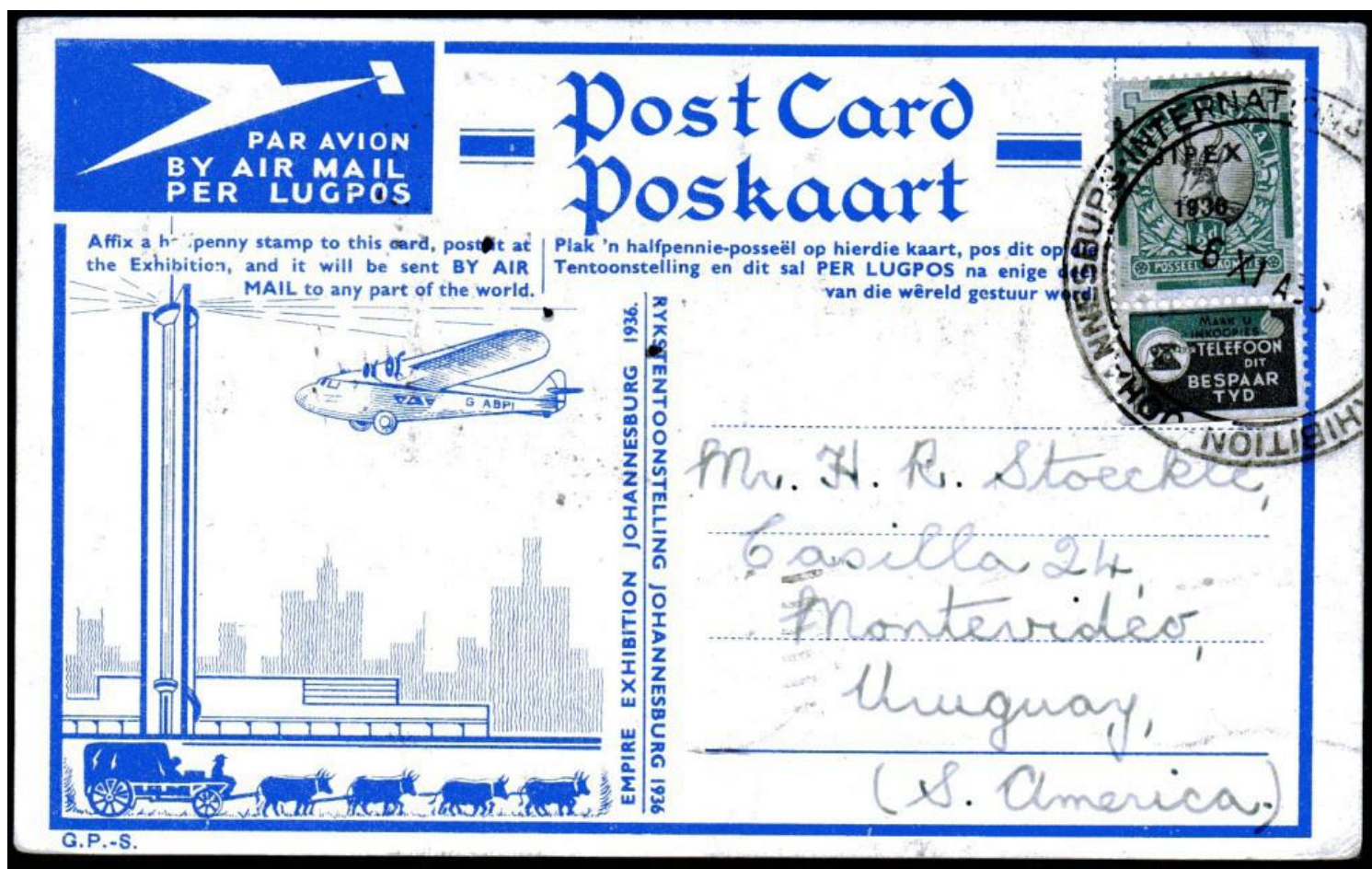

## Why join a specialist society? By David Macdonald

Being a member of a specialist society usually means that you received a quarterly newsletter, which to a widespread membership is the only way to keep regular contact. The advantage to a member can be varied, information can be gleaned from articles, information submitted to extend what is already known, and information can be requested for new subjects to be explored. Advice on items can be sought for other members and material exchanged.

Earlier this year I read a newsletter (*The Springbok*) from a specialist society (South Africa Collectors Society); a member was trying to make a list of known used postcards – South Africa 1/2d All-up Air Mail Cards. For a number of years I have had some of these cards in my collection and yes they were, in 1936/1937 flow anywhere in the world provided an Air Service existed. I duly sent a record of all cards in my possession thinking that would be all I would hear until a list of cards was published. Not so! I was asked to send a scan of one particular card (see below) posted at the Empire Exhibition, Johannesburg on 6 November 1936 to the addressee resident in Montevideo, Uruguay; on the face of it a bog standard card.



This card was sent from Johannesburg on the Imperial Airways service to Croydon arriving two days late on 17 November. Wednesday 18 Nov. Croydon to Frankfurt on the Deutsche Lufthansa (DLH) night service, thence on Thursday 19 Nov. by DLH from Frankfurt to Bathurst, Gambia, arriving 20 November. Suspension of fixed wing flights across the South Atlantic was occasionally necessary to maintain the planes (Dornier Wal flying boats) and the service station boats. To maintain the mail service Deutsche Luftschiff Zepppelin Reederei ('DLZ') flew the Graff Zepellin (LZ-127) and the Hindenburg (LZ-29) crossing being shared. The card was carried on the Hindenburg (LZ-129) from Bathurst on Sunday 22 Nov. arriving Natal, Brazil on 23 Nov. and went onward to Montevideo by the Sindicato Condor service to Montevideo arriving 24 November 1936.

The evidence of the card having been carried on the Hindenburg is the arrival cancel applied at Montevideo, on the picture side of the card. Without being a member of SACS, and a member's request for information, I might never have appreciated the significance of the card which is, I believe at present, the only known (recorded) "All-up" card, with conclusive proof, by the receiving cancel, to have been carried on the Hindenburg airship!
